

Introduction

- 1. Start off by gathering tree data for the neighborhood as well as data about the history and demographics of the neighborhood.
- Then seek out neighborhood leadership and walk through the neighborhood with them.
- Next, identify key areas of interest and establish goals that are clear and realistic.
- Set general guidelines for the project and outline a useful and practical way that will ensure goals are met.
- Identify how progress will be tracked and measured.
- Set a timeframe for the project in which reporting will be done and given to the community for analysis.
- Identify when you will conclude the project 4. and how the report on the work done will be presented and published for the community.
 - If goals are not met there should be a new plan created to meet these goals unless a disclaimer at the beginning of the project that if goals aren't met no further project will be created.





In order to get the most benefits out of the trees it is important to plant a diverse crop of trees. The general rule to follow is no more than 10% of the same species, 20% of the same genus, and 30% of the same family. In terms of species that do well in and around Indianapolis here are a few examples: American Elm, Northern Catalpa, Red Cedar, and Bur Oak.
